

[Kingsbury Hill Farm](#) was the last privately-owned, sanctioned event in NH when it stopped running in 2008. The land that sited the event is now for sale, but there is an effort underway to protect the land for future equestrian uses. The Sanderson/Campbell family is in the process of placing a conservation easement on the farm to protect it from development and to allow future equestrian use. The project is being coordinated by The Russell Foundation, a local non-profit.

KHF operated as a girls riding camp from 1967-2008 and for many years as a USEA-sanctioned horse trials (BN-T), a USEA Adult Camp and a USEA Junior Event Camp. At the end of the 2008 season, KHF closed its doors.

How can we keep this valuable parcel of land available for equestrian use?

Private donations are being sought toward the conservation of Kingsbury Hill, in hopes that an equestrian buyer can be found to purchase the property and continue its wonderful tradition of competition and learning. The Federal Farm and Ranchland Protection Program, the Town of Frankestown and regional and local land conservation groups all see the importance of Kingsbury Hill and have provided the majority of funds needed for the project. Presently there is a \$30,000 deficit to reach the goal of permanently protecting this property with a conservation easement. If you want to help, contributions should be directed to:
